

### Kevin Henderson (fiddle) & Mattias Perez (guitar)

Shetlander Kevin Henderson is one of the most exciting young fiddlers on the world stage, performing with five groups: Fiddlers' Bid, Boys of the Lough, Session A9, The Nordic Fiddlers Bloc, and Aamos. Inspired by his grandfather to play at age nine, Kevin studied briefly under renowned Shetland fiddler Trevor Hunter before going on to study with Willie Hunter, arguably Shetland's finest ever fiddler. Kevin is joined by Swedish guitarist Mattias Perez to play music from their album 'Fin Da Laand Ageen,' a collection of traditional fiddle music from Shetland.

Young French-Canadian Brunet brings the infectiously rhythmic tunes of Quebec. Along with acclaimed guitarist Quemener from Brittany, the quartet combines their talents, traditions, and spontaneous humour for an evening of dazzling energy and subtle

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
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

### 10.30am Special Outdoor Event: Fiddle Walk

Performer, teacher and director of the Niel Gow Festival in Dunkeld & Birnam, Pete Clark helps promote and sustain the fiddle tradition in highland Perthshire. Join Pete for a ramble through the streets of Edinburgh for talk, tunes, a pie and a pint! Approx 2½ hours at leisurely pace. Meet in QH Foyer.

### 12.30pm Steve Burnett: Fiddle Maintenance

Maker of the "Sherlock" violin, Scottish instrument maker Steve Burnett builds his violins, violas and cellos in the old Italian/Scottish spirit. Steve will share his views on tonal production, set up, and give advice on buying a fiddle.

# 12.30pm Bruce MacGregor: The Secret Life of a Radio Presenter

Presenter of one of BBC Radio Scotland's flagship music shows, Travelling Folk, Bruce McGregor will provide a glimpse into some of the best and worst interviews, as well as some of the classic moments.

# 1.30pm Murray Campbell: How does the Fiddle Work?

Murray Campbell teaches and researches the science of musical instruments at the University of Edinburgh, and directs the University's Musical Acoustics Research Group. This talk explains and illustrates some of the scientific principles underlying the behaviour of the fiddle and the techniques of fiddle playing.

### 2.30pm Patsy Seddon: The Kodály Approach

The Kodály approach to music education follows natural child development stages and is based on singing games and rhymes. It features relative solfa, rhythm names and handsigns. One of Scotland's most innovative harp players, Patsy Seddon will present her experiences with the basic principles and practices of Kodály music teaching.

### 3.30pm Allan MacDonald: Ceòl Mór Music

Allan MacDonald will explore the close correlation between the rhythms of language in Gaelic song and the ceòl mór idiom. He will bring tunes to life by placing them back in their socio-linguistic context and demonstrate their great lyrical and melodic powers - removing the mystery that is often associated with the pibroch genre.


